All college freshmen and sophomores, regardless of their major, have to take certain general education requirements. It makes sense to take as many as you can in high school at a cost savings to you.



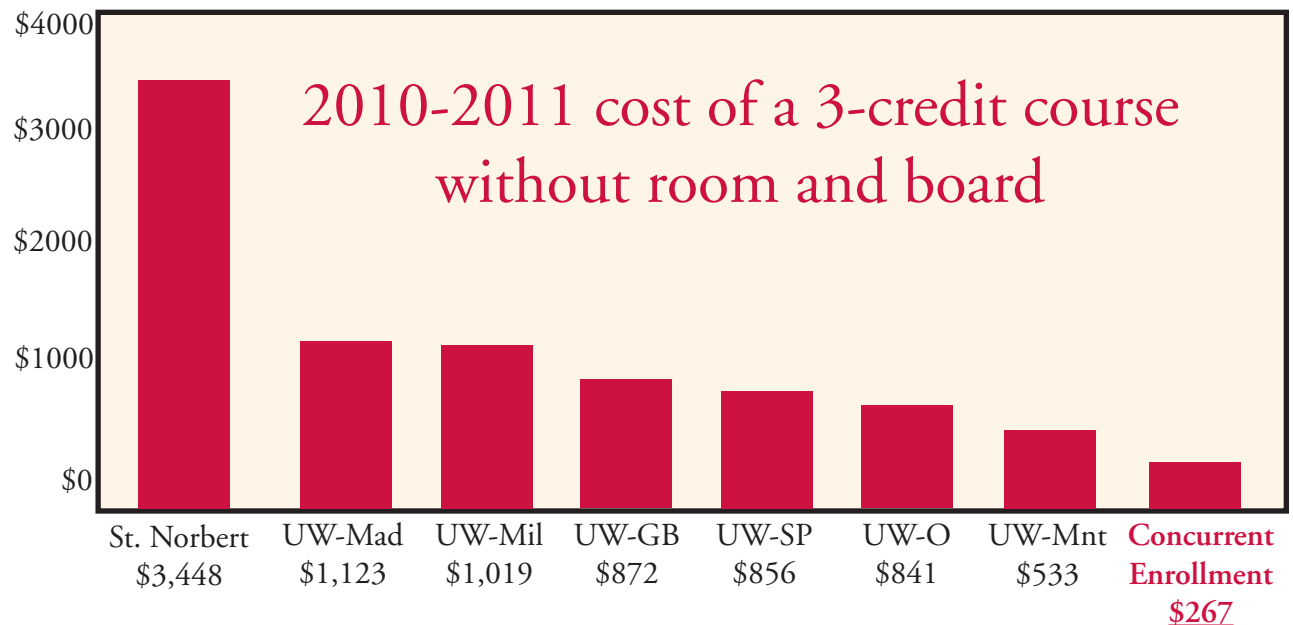
Compare Costs
